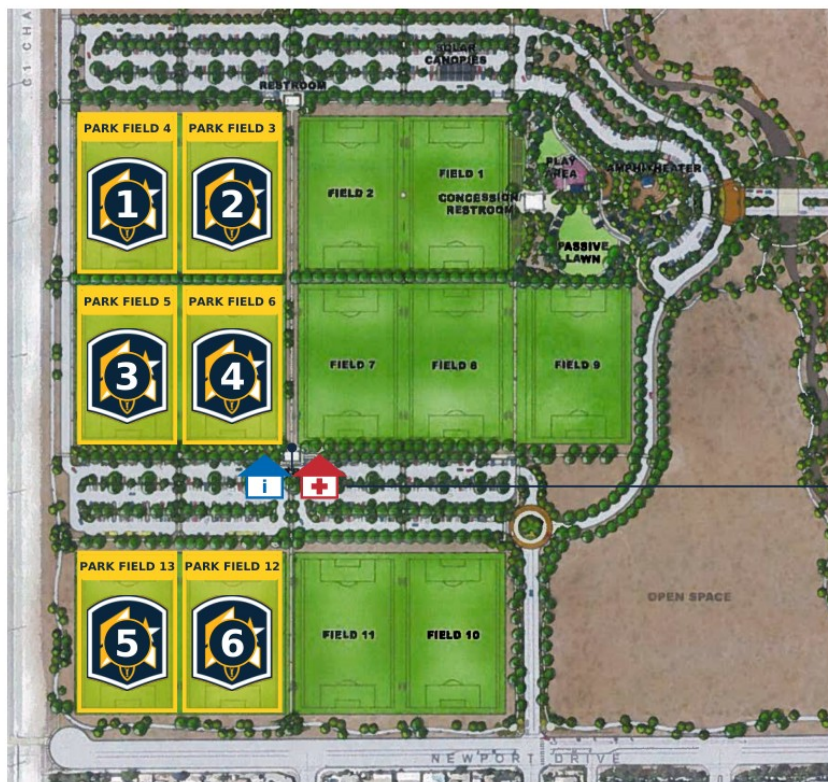

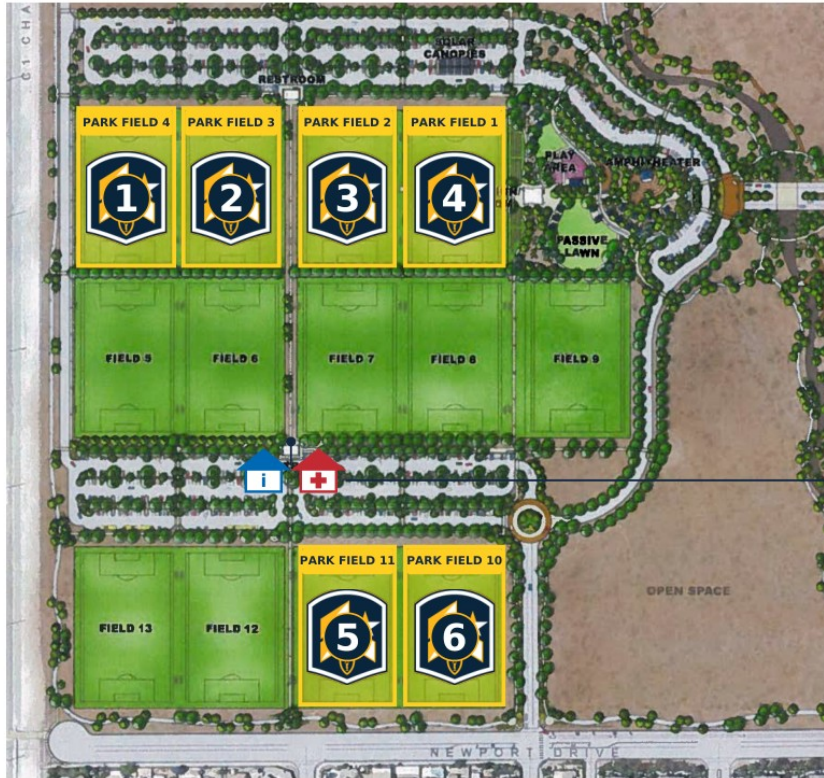

Program Leadership

Jono Zissi | Director

Zissi was a three-year starter and two-time All-New England selection at Tufts. As the program's offensive coordinator, he helped Tufts win its first NCAA Division III title in 2010. The longtime WCS director has also led Torrey Pines to multiple CIF championships and helped West Coast athletes reach the college level.

Jesse Foss | Director • 2031 Coach

Foss is the head coach at Concordia University Irvine, where he won the 2023 MCLA Division I championship and guided the move to NCAA Division II. In 2026, he earned RMAC Coach of the Year honors and led CUI to its first RMAC tournament title and NCAA appearance.
